Critical Thinking Questions

- 1. What was the accusation that the Jews had against Paul? Were they speaking of their law or Roman law (compare Acts 6:13; 21:28; 25:8)?
- 2. What is the significance of Gallio's action resulting in the beating of Sosthenes, the ruler of the synagogue (see 1 Corinthians 1:1)?
- 3. Upon his arrival in Ephesus, Paul made his way to the synagogue. How can this action of Paul be understood in the context of his earlier expressions and conduct in Acts 18:6?
- 4. How do Paul's journeys and activities in this passage reflect his response to the vision and the message he received from the Lord during his time in Corinth (refer to Acts 18:9-10)?
- 5. What is the significance of Luke, including the story of Priscilla and Aquila, explaining the way of God more accurately to Apollos (Acts 18:26)?

Gallio

• rejected the complaint of the Jews (vv. 14-16).

Paul

- travled to Syria (v. 18).
- cut his hair for a vow (v. 18).
- traveled to Ephesus (v. 19).
- reasoned with the Jews in the synagogue (v. 19).
- visited the churches in Caesarea and Antioch (v. 22-23).
- strengthened the disciples in Galatia and Phrygia (v. 23).

Priscilla and Aquila

- traveled with Paul to Ephesus (v. 19).
- explained to Apollos the way of God more accurately (v. 26).

Apollos

- was an eloquent man (v. 24).
- was competent in the Scriptures (v. 24).
- instructed in the way of the Lord (v. 25).
- was fervent in spirit (v. 25).
- spoke and taught accurately about Jesus (v. 25).
- greatly helped the disciples in Achaia (v. 27).
- powerfully refuted the Jews in public (v. 28).
